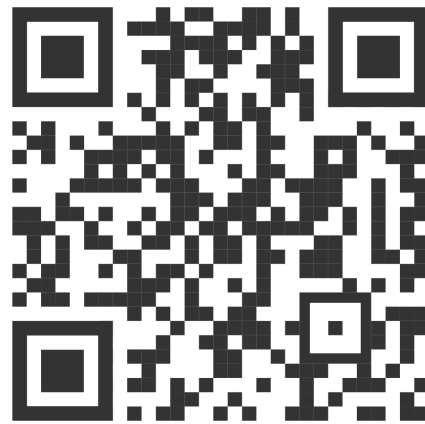

The U.S. Military Academy at West Point

The mission of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point is to educate, train, and inspire the Corps of Cadets so that each graduate is a commissioned leader of character committed to the values of Duty, Honor, Country and prepared for a career of professional excellence and service to the Nation as an officer in the United States Army.

Since its founding over two centuries ago, the Military Academy has accomplished its mission by developing cadets in four critical areas: intellectual, physical, military, and moral-ethical - a four-year process called the "West Point Experience." Specific developmental goals are addressed through several fully coordinated and integrated programs.

A challenging Academic Program that offers 36 majors and 19 minors provides a balanced education in the arts and sciences. The West Point curriculum provides a grounding in the liberal arts and engineering, a study of a discipline in depth, and experiential learning opportunities that prepare cadets to think critically, internalize their professional identity, and employ their education to help build the Army and the nation's future.

The Physical Program at West Point includes both physical education classes and competitive athletics. Every cadet participates in an intercollegiate, club or intramural level sport each semester. This rigorous physical program contributes to the mental and physical fitness that is required for service as an officer in the Army.

Cadets learn basic military skills, including leadership, through a demanding Military Program which begins on their first day at West Point. Most military training takes place during the summer, with new cadets undergoing Cadet Basic Training the first year, followed by Cadet Field Training at nearby Camp Buckner the second year. Cadets spend their third and fourth summers serving in active Army units around the world; attending advanced training courses such as airborne, air assault or northern warfare; or training the first- and second-year cadets as members of the leadership cadre. Military training is combined with military science instruction to provide a solid military foundation for officership.

Moral-ethical development occurs through the Character Program. This includes formal instruction in the important values of the military profession, voluntary religious programs, interaction with staff and faculty role models, key commitment ceremonies, and a robust guest speaker program. The foundation of the ethical code at West Point is found in the Academy's motto, "Duty, Honor, Country." Cadets also develop ethically by adhering to the Cadet Honor Code, which states "A cadet will not lie, cheat, steal, or tolerate those who do."

Admission is open to all young men and women and is extremely competitive. Candidates must receive a nomination from a member of Congress or from the Department of the Army. They are then evaluated on their academic, physical and leadership potential. Those candidates who are fully qualified receive appointments to the Academy.

From the day of its founding on March 16, 1802, West Point has grown in its size and stature, but it remains committed to the task of producing commissioned leaders of character for America's Army. Today, the Academy graduates more than 900 new officers annually, which represents approximately 20 percent of the new lieutenants required by the Army each year. The student body, or Corps of Cadets, numbers 4,400, of whom approximately 24 percent are women and 30 percent are underrepresented minorities.

A favorite expression at West Point is that "much-of the history we teach was made by people we taught." Great leaders such as Grant, Pershing, MacArthur, Eisenhower, Patton, Westmoreland and Schwarzkopf are among the more than 60,000 graduates of the Military Academy. Countless others have served society in the fields of medicine, law, business, politics, and science following their careers in uniform.

Ever mindful of its rich heritage, West Point continues to prepare its graduates to serve as commissioned leaders of character in America's 21st Century Army. Guided by its timeless motto, "Duty, Honor, Country," the Academy is poised confidently to provide the Army and the Nation with its third century of service.

The Honorable Robert A. McDonald 8th Secretary, Department of Veterans Affairs, Retired Chairman, President, and Chief Executive Officer, Procter & Gamble

Robert A. “Bob” McDonald was nominated by President Obama to serve as the eighth Secretary of Veterans Affairs (VA), and he was confirmed unanimously by the United States Senate on July 29, 2014. Secretary McDonald led VA in its ambitious transformational journey to be a world-class service provider and the No. 1 customer-service agency in the Federal government to give Veterans consistent, high-quality experiences. The Harvard Business School judged that, thanks to Secretary McDonald’s leadership, the MyVA “team had made impressive progress.”

Before joining VA, Bob McDonald was Chairman, President, and Chief Executive Officer of The Procter & Gamble Company (P&G). Under his leadership, P&G significantly recalibrated its product portfolio, added nearly one billion people to its global customer base, and grew organic sales by an average of three percent per year.

This growth was reflected in P&G’s stock price that rose from \$51.10 the day he became CEO to \$81.64 the day his last quarterly results were announced—a 60 percent increase from 2009 to 2013. During his tenure, P&G was widely recognized for its leader development prowess. Chief Executive Magazine named P&G the best company for developing leader talent. The Hay Group consistently cited P&G in its top-tier listing of Best Companies for Leadership.

Bob McDonald is personally and professionally committed to values-based leadership and to improving the lives of others. Bob and his wife, Diane, are the founders of The McDonald Conference for Leaders of Character at West Point. Bob is Chairman of the Board of the West Point Association of Graduates. He served as April and Jay Graham Fellow at the George W. Bush Institute, advocating for post-9/11 Veterans. In 2020 Bob was appointed to President Biden’s Transition Advisory Board. He currently serves on the Boards of Audia Group, Quotient Technology, and Miraki Innovation.

Bob McDonald graduated from the United States Military Academy at West Point in 1975. He earned his MBA from the University of Utah in 1978. In 2010 the University of Utah Alumni Association named Bob a Distinguished Graduate. The West Point Association of Graduates named McDonald for its admired Distinguished Graduate Award in 2017. In 2014, The President of the Republic of Singapore awarded Bob the Public Service Star for his work helping shape Singapore’s development as an international hub connecting global companies with Asian firms and enterprises. In 2021 the American Chamber of Commerce Foundation gave Bob its President’s Award for Lifetime Achievement.

An Army Veteran, Bob served with the 82nd Airborne Division. He completed Jungle, Arctic, and Desert Warfare Training. And he earned the Ranger tab, Expert Infantryman Badge, and Senior Parachutist Wings. He received the Meritorious Service Medal upon leaving military service. Bob McDonald and his wife are the parents of two grown children and the proud grandparents of three grandsons and three granddaughters.

Diane McDonald (pronounced “Dee-anne”) was born in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Upon graduating from Chatham College, she taught kindergarten and elementary school-aged children and coached high school sports, where her passion was working with children.

After her husband, Bob McDonald left the military and joined Procter and Gamble (P&G), a multinational consumer goods company, they lived abroad for fifteen years in Canada, the Philippines, Japan and Belgium. At each location Diane played a leadership role in the P&G Community, in her children’s schools and in their activities. She was a Girl Scout and Boy Scout Leader, Sunday school and Vacation Bible School Leader, home room mother, PTA Officer, Member of the Japanese American Women’s Club, Member of American Women’s Club in the Philippines and Belgium, and P&G support group leader, among other roles.

When they returned stateside Diane co-chaired from 2009-2013 Procter & Gamble Transferees, Inc., PGITI, a non-profit support group for spouses, partners, employees and families. PGITI had 750 international families living in Cincinnati, P&G’s headquarters city, and chapters throughout the world. PGITI cares for families as they move outside their home countries by providing support and interest groups, language groups, moving advice and assistance, legal advice, cultural and educational activities, community service opportunities, social activities, and more. Prior to leading PGITI globally, Diane developed PGITI-like chapters in countries where she lived and integrated them when she was Global Co-Chair.

After Bob retired from P&G they moved to Washington D. C. where her husband served as Secretary of Veteran Affairs under President Obama. Diane was involved in helping him and is an active member of the Congressional Club.

Diane and Bob are founding benefactors of the McDonald Conference for Leaders of Character (MCLC) held at The United States Military Academy each year. Leslie T. Fenwick, PhD, is noted for her expertise in leadership and ethics and public policy. Known as a “fearless voice” for education equity, Dr. Fenwick was one of two fully vetted finalists for the U.S. Secretary of Education in 2020. In 2022, she was appointed by U.S. President Joseph R. Biden to the Board of Visitors for the U.S. Military Academy at West Point (USMA). A former Harvard University Visiting Scholar and Visiting Fellow, she is author of the award-winning book *Jim Crow’s Pink Slip* (Harvard Education Press, 2022). *Jim Crow’s Pink Slip* is winner of the 2023 Gloria Ladson-Billings Outstanding Book of the Year Award, an NPR Book of the Day, and Amazon Bestseller in Education History. Her public policy research and op-ed articles have been cited and published by the New York Times, Washington Post, Politico, and the Center for American

Progress. She has delivered more than 100 distinguished lectures and keynotes to national and international audiences, been a featured speaker on Capitol Hill and at the National Press Club (Washington DC), and appeared on NPR, CNN, C-SPAN Live, Yahoo! Business News, and Washington Post Live discussing education equity and workforce development.

Dr. Fenwick has served as a consultant to CEO Action for Racial Equity founded by Tim Ryan, U.S. Chairman and Senior Partner, PwC. Featured in the New York Times, CEO Action for Racial Equity is the first business-led coalition (comprised of 2000 corporate chairmen and CEOs) of its kind with a mission to advance racial equity through public policy. Since 2017, Dr. Fenwick has been a McDonald Character Leadership Conference (MCLC) Senior Fellow at the USMA where she delivered the 2019 Annual Corbin Distinguished Lecture on Women in Leadership and the 2017 Black History Month Distinguished Lecturer. Dr. Fenwick has served on a number of non-profit boards including: (presently) the Smithsonian National Museum of African American History and Culture (NMAAHC) Scholarly Advisory Committee, the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education (AACTE) Board of Directors, and the national Advisory Board for Edutopia (formerly, the George Lucas Education Foundation). She is recipient of a 2021 Commendation for Women’s History Month by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs and the 2011 WEB DuBois Award for Higher Education Leadership Award.

Dr. Fenwick is Dean in Residence at the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education (AACTE) and Dean Emerita of the Howard University School of Education where she is a tenured professor of education policy. She earned a PhD in education policy and leadership studies at The Ohio State University where she was a Flesher Fellow and a bachelor’s degree at the University of Virginia.



Mike Haynie, PhD

Dr. Mike Haynie is Vice Chancellor for Strategic Initiatives & Innovation at Syracuse University and is responsible for a diverse portfolio of academic programs, centers, and innovation initiatives that include the University’s Office of Veterans and Military Affairs, as well as Government and Community Relations, and the College of Professional Studies. In 2011, Haynie founded Syracuse University’s D’Aniello Institute for Veterans & Military Families (IVMF), the nation’s first interdisciplinary training and research institute informing and advancing the policy, economic, and wellness concerns of the America’s veterans and families. Today, the D’Aniello Institute’s national training programs serve 25,000 transitioning service members, veterans, and military spouses annually, and the Institute is widely acknowledged as the nation’s leading academic voice related to issues impacting veterans and military-connected families. In 2018, Syracuse University named Haynie a University Professor, the most senior rank awarded to faculty.

Dr. Haynie has received numerous awards for his scholarship, teaching, and community engagement, and he routinely provides counsel to private and public sector leaders on issues related to small business, innovation, and veterans. In 2013, Haynie was appointed by the Obama Administration to serve as Chairman of the U.S. Department of Labor’s Federal Advisory Committee on Veterans’ Employment and Training. In 2015, the White House asked Haynie to serve as vice chairman of a Presidential Task Force, chartered to set the course for long-term reform at the U.S. Department of Veteran Affairs. In 2019, Haynie was named to the prestigious HillVets100 list of the nation’s 100 most influential veterans, service members and veteran-community advocates. The following year, Advancing Diversity inducted him into its Hall of Honors for his commitment of diversity, equality and inclusion and Time magazine selected him as one of 16 people and groups fighting for a more equal America. In addition, Dr. Haynie is a current appointee to the CNBC Disruptor 50 Council – a group of world’s leading thinkers in the field of innovation and entrepreneurship.

Before beginning his academic career at Syracuse University, Haynie served for 14 years as an officer in the United States Air Force.

Ms. Suzanne (Suzy) Puanani Vares-Lum took office as President of the East-West Center in January 2022. She is the first woman and Native Hawaiian chosen for this role. Vares-Lum brings executive leadership and planning experience spanning the past several decades, culminating in five years serving with and advising the most senior officials at US Indo-Pacific Command, where she cultivated and maintained key relationships with nations throughout the Indo-Pacific region.

As a retired U.S. Army Major General with 34 years of service, Vares-Lum has held key roles addressing priority national security challenges in the region. After retirement, she formed Vares-Lum Indo-Pacific Consulting, LLC to provide consulting and advising

on regional issues. She is a seasoned keynote speaker and advocate on Indo-Pacific issues; leadership and mentorship; and Women, Peace, and Security. She led collaborative initiatives in the Pacific, including Hawai'i, Guam, and the Commonwealth of Northern Mariana Islands.

As a community leader, Vares-Lum serves on a variety of non-profit boards, including the American Red Cross Pacific Islands Region, Pacific & Asian Affairs Council, and the Pacific International Center for High technology Research. She has also served on committees that promote Hawai'i's economic diversification, workforce development, and community dialogues on issues regarding land and water. She has also served as a Strategic Advisor to the Hawai'i Chamber of Commerce Military Affairs Council, and is an active member of the U.S.-Japan Council.

She received her Bachelor of Arts degree in Journalism in 1989 and her Master of Education in Teaching in 1996 from the University of Hawai'i at Manoa. As a graduate of the US Army War College, she earned a Master of Strategic Studies degree in 2011. In 2019, she became a National Security Fellow of the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs at Syracuse University. She is also an alumna of the Daniel K. Inouye Asia-Pacific Center for Security Studies.

Vares-Lum received the Ellis Island Medal of Honor in 2017. Additionally, the State of Hawai'i House of Representatives, Governor of the State of Hawai'i, and Hawai'i Congressional Delegation presented her with certificates of recognition for outstanding service to the State of Hawai'i in 2021.

Ms. Vares-Lum is a resident of Kaneohe, Hawai'i, and is married to Courtney Vares-Lum, and they have two daughters, Diana (24) and Connie (20).

H. Patrick Swygert is President Emeritus of Howard University and the State University of New York at Albany (SUNY-Albany) and former Executive Vice President of Temple University. During his tenures at SUNY-Albany and Howard University, he led historic and record-breaking capital campaigns featured in the New York Times, Washington Post, Chronicle of Higher Education, and Diverse Issues in Higher Education.

In 2021, Mr. Swygert was appointed by the U.S. Secretary of Defense to the Defense Policy Board (DPB). He has been a member of the National Security Agency (NSA) Advisory Board and the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) External Advisory Board.

Mr. Swygert served as a Director of United Technologies Corporation (UTC) – a Fortune 30 company – for 16 years and The Hartford Financial Services Group, Inc. for 20 years. He has been retained as consultant to both companies and PNC Bank. Mr. Swygert has been appointed to federal commissions by Presidents George H. W. Bush, George W. Bush, and Bill Clinton. Mr. Swygert began his career in higher education as a law professor at Temple University where he also served as Interim Dean of Temple University's School of Law. His research and opinion pieces about access to higher education, and education equity and the law have been published in scholarly journals and by the New York Times, Washington Post, and Philadelphia Inquirer.

Since 2017, Mr. Swygert has been a MCLC Senior Fellow at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point where he also delivered the 2018 Black History Month Distinguished Lecture. A Founding Member of the Advisory Council for the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of African American History and Culture, Mr. Swygert was also appointed in 2019 by the U.S. Secretary of the Interior to the 400 Years of African American History Commission.

Mr. Swygert holds a J.D. degree from Howard University where he graduated first in his class. He is recipient of nine honorary doctorate degrees, the State of Maryland Senate Award for Exemplary Leadership, Congressional Black Caucus Educator of the Year Award, NAACP Educator of the Year Award, and the Urban League Educator of the Year Award. He is a member of the bar for the District of Columbia, Pennsylvania and New York. Mr. Swygert is married to Dr. Leslie T. Fenwick and has two sons, H. Patrick Swygert, Jr. and Michael B. Swygert (both of whom hold JD degrees).

Colonel Woodruff is the Director of the West Point Leadership Center and the Eisenhower/Benavidez Leader Development Programs. He previously directed the Department of Behavioral Sciences and Leadership's Academy Professor for Leadership and Management Studies, majors, chaired the West Point Leader Development System -Integration Committee, and served as a career infantryman. His previous assignments include four combat deployments to Iraq and Afghanistan, six tours with operational warfighting regiments, including Stryker, air assault, light, and armor assignments. His leadership positions have ranged from being a squad leader in West Germany patrolling the border against the Soviets; multiple squad, section, and platoon leader

positions; two company commands that included developing and fielding of the Army's first Stryker units; to his final infantry assignment where he was the deployed battalion S3, XO, and acting commander for 1-14 Infantry (Stryker) in Iraq (2007 to 2009). Additionally, COL Woodruff has served in several staff positions, including Chief of IED-Defeat for the 25th Infantry Division during combat operations in Iraq (2006-2007), and Director of the Commander's Action Group (CAG) and Strategic Initiatives for Joint Task Force-1 in Bagram, Afghanistan (2017). COL Woodruff's experiences also reflect his strong emphasis on the Soldier-Scholar model. From his first exposure to West Point as a young sergeant training cadets, COL Woodruff has had a strong commitment to the Academy and the development of leaders. Since that summer, COL Woodruff has completed a Bachelor of Science and an MBA in management from Southern Illinois University, a Masters in Sociology from the University of Maryland, a PhD in Marketing from the Kenan-Flagler Business School at the University of North Carolina, and a Masters of Strategic Studies from the Army War College.

Furthermore, he is a member of the Board of Trustees of Blue Earth Foundation and the Vice Chairman of the Zurich Opera House.

From 2009-2011, Everett was the commanding officer of the U.S. Army Garrison-Schweinfurt (Germany), responsible for a community of over 10,000 Americans. Prior to that, he was a White House Fellow during the Bush and Obama Administration's transition

year, where he served as the acting Deputy Chief Operating Officer of the U.S. Treasury's Office of Financial Stability, "the TARP." During 2007-2008, Everett was the aide-de-camp for the Commander, Multi-National Force-Iraq, for "the Surge." At the start of his career, Everett was a platoon leader and staff officer at Fort Bragg, where he was a member of the winning team of the 82nd Airborne Division's Best Ranger Competition and placed 6th in the Army-wide competition. As a captain in Germany, Everett led his company on the initial NATO deployment into Kosovo, after which they were recognized with the Itschner Award, given annually to the outstanding engineer company in the US Army. Everett received a Doctor of Business Administration (DBA) in management from Harvard Business School, a Master of Business Administration from Duke University's Fuqua School, and a Bachelor of Science in Environmental Engineering from West Point.

He also holds a Master of Science degree in National Security Strategy from the National War College, and both a Master of Arts and a Ph.D. in Psychology from the University of Maryland – College Park. Archie is a graduate of the Adjutant General's Corps Officer Basic Course and Captains Career Course, the Combined Arms Services and Staff School, and the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College. His assignments include duty at Fort Carson, Colorado, where he

was assigned to the 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment as the Officer Strength Manager, and he later commanded the Alpha Detachment of the 4th Personnel Services Battalion. Following his assignment at Fort Carson, he attended graduate school, then served as an Assistant Professor teaching Leadership and Management courses at West Point. His next assignment was as Brigade S1 for 2nd Brigade, 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault) -- both at Fort Campbell, KY and in Baghdad, Iraq. He later served as the Executive Officer to the Director of Human Resources Policy on the Army Staff at the Pentagon. Subsequently, Colonel Bates was selected to be a White House Fellow and Special Assistant to First Lady Michelle Obama. He worked with Ms. Obama to inspire the public and private sector to provide better employment, education, and wellness opportunities for service members, veterans, and their families. Following that assignment, he was a Legislative Liaison working for the Secretary of the Army. Archie's last assignment was as battalion commander for the 120th Reception Battalion at Fort Jackson, SC -- the Army's largest reception station, bringing into the Army over 40,000 Soldiers a year. Colonel Bates' awards include the Bronze Star Medal, Military Outstanding Volunteer Service Medal, Parachutist Badge, Air Assault Badge, Presidential Service Badge, Army Staff Badge, and Major General Newman Award for Leadership Excellence.

CEO of the Toronto Blue Jays

Mark Shapiro President & CEO, Toronto Blue Jays Mark Shapiro is one of the few Major League Baseball executives that has experience in all facets of the game –baseball, business, and league operations –over the course of a career that spans more than 30 years. Mark was appointed President & CEO of the Toronto Blue Jays in November 2015, a role that oversees the organization’s business and baseball operations and represents ownership at the league level. Mark is responsible for the expansion of the Blue Jays’ systems and capabilities in several areas, including player development, high performance, strategy, and analytics. He has championed two significant

capital projects in his tenure: upgrading the team’s Spring Training home in Dunedin, FL, with the Player Development Complex, an industry-leading performance facility, and the renovations to Rogers Centre. Under Mark’s leadership, the Blue Jays have twice reached the postseason, in 2016 and 2020. Mark’s baseball career began in 1992 in Cleveland, where he spent 24 seasons. He joined Cleveland as an assistant in baseball operations and quickly progressed into a senior leadership role as Director of Minor League Operations before becoming Vice President of Baseball Operations & Assistant General Manager in 1999. Mark was named Executive Vice President & General Manager in 2002 and held that position until he was appointed Team President in 2011. Following both the 2005 and 2007 seasons, Mark was named the Sporting News “Executive of the Year” and was the only active General Manager in MLB at that time to win the award twice. In 2005, he was also named “Executive of the Year” by Baseball America. Beyond his extensive work in the front office, Mark has been involved in key baseball initiatives at Major League Baseball for more than a decade. He currently sits on the league’s Competition Committee; On Field Committee; Long-Term Strategic Planning Committee; and Revenue Sharing Definitions Committee. In addition, he is a member of the Board of Directors for Jays Care Foundation, the charitable arm of the Toronto Blue Jays. A Baltimore native, Mark played four years of football at Princeton University, where he earned a bachelor’s degree in history. He lives in Toronto with his family.

Seema is also the Founder and Chair of Girls Who Invest, a non-profit organization dedicated to increasing the number of women in portfolio management and executive leadership in the asset management industry. Previously, Seema was the Founder and Chief Investment Officer of SevenStep Capital, an opportunistic investment platform focused on seeding women portfolio managers. Seema served until June 30, 2014 as Chief Investment Officer for the New York City Retirement Systems which had assets of \$160 billion. Previous to this appointment, Seema was Interim Chief Investment Officer and before that Head of Public Equities & Hedge Funds for the pension funds. Under her leadership, the pension fund was named Hedge Fund Manager of the Year - Large Public Pension Plans by Institutional Investor. Prior to Seema’s four years of public sector experience, she served as Global Director of Fundamental Research at Pyramis Global Advisors; a Partner, Portfolio Manager and Senior Equity Analyst with hedge fund Andor Capital Management; a Partner and Senior Equity Analyst at hedge fund Pequot Capital Management; Co-founder of hedge fund Mirador Capital Management; and an Equity Analyst with T. Rowe Price.

Seema has worked with several organizations focused on issues concerning women and girls and is a prolific speaker on the topic of a more robust inclusion of women in the corporate sector. She was awarded in 2021 the insignia of Chevalier of the National Order of the Legion of Honor by France. She was also recognized in 2021 as one of 100 most influential women in U.S. finance by Barron’s, honored as the 2019 Bloomberg 50 “Ones To Watch”, the 2016 Woman with Impact by the Connecticut Women’s Business Development Council, and Wall Street Women Entrepreneur of the Year in 2015 by Traders magazine. Seema served as a member of the National Finance Committee of Secretary Clinton’s 2016 Presidential Campaign. She is a Board Director of the non-profit organization Women’s World Banking, a Senior Advisor for The Wharton School Stevens Center for Innovation in Finance Cypher Accelerator, and an active member of The Economic Club of New York. Seema earned a B.A. in psychology/philosophy from Yale College and an MBA in finance from The Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania.

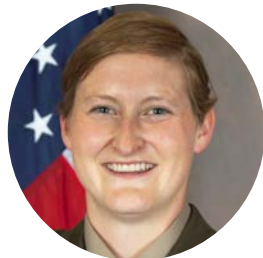

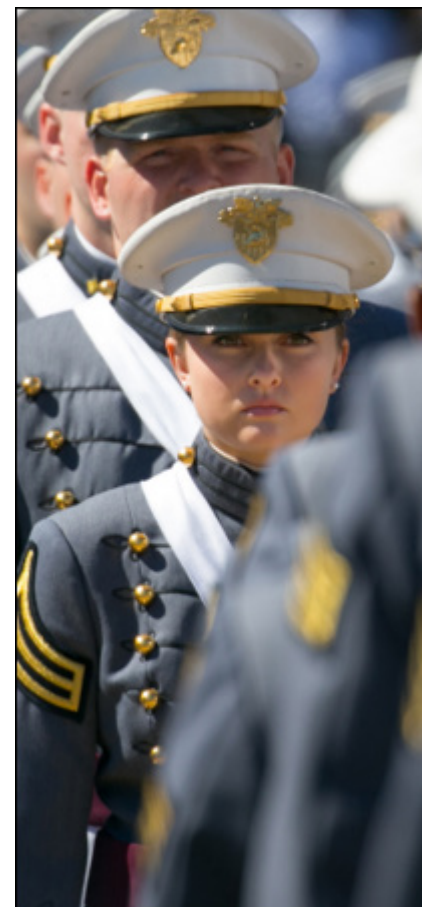
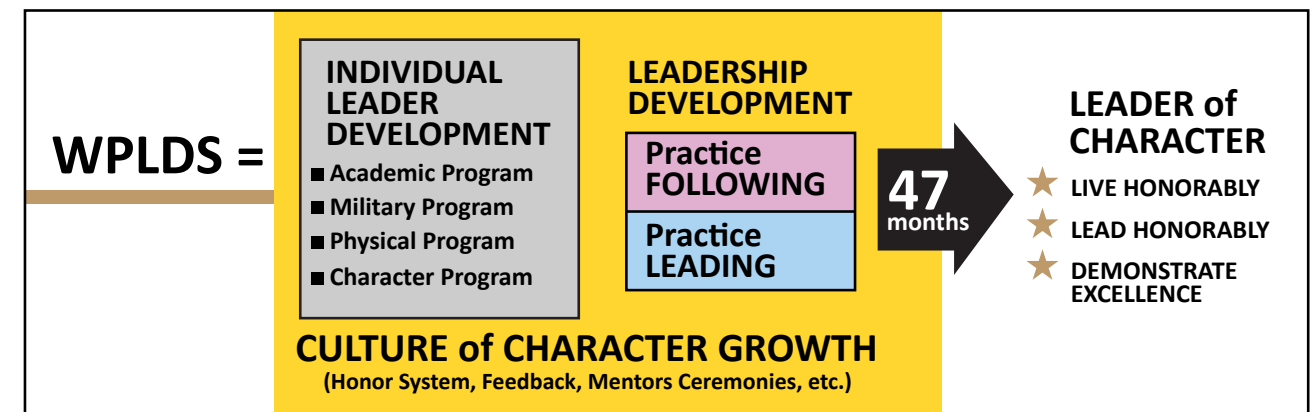

Key Conference Locations

The Thayer Hotel. This landmark West Point hotel has been a celebrated part of American history since 1926, when it was established to accommodate U.S. Military Academy personnel and their guests. It is named in honor Colonel Sylvanus Thayer, superintendent of the academy from 1817 to 1833, and listed on the National Registry of Historic Places.

Washington Hall. First completed in 1929, is the cadet dining area, also called the “Mess Hall.” All 4,400 members of the Corps eat at one time in around 25 minutes for most breakfasts, lunches, and dinners. A large mural in the southwest wing, completed in 1936 depicts the history of weapons and warfare used in many of the most decisive battles fought through time. Out the front door down the steps of Washington Hall is a statue remembering President George Washington atop his horse.

Eisenhower Hall. Dedicated to bringing great performances to the United States Corps of Cadets and to its friends and neighbors throughout the Hudson Valley. Completed in 1975, Eisenhower Hall Theatre is the Hudson Valley’s premier performing arts center and is a special showplace where stars appear regularly and where the excitement of Broadway plays and musicals are standard fare. Opera, dance, symphony orchestras, comedians, staged spectaculars, country and rock are all on the menu. The venue also hosts briefings to the entire Corps of Cadets from Presidents, Chiefs of Staff, and other key leaders and guest speakers.

Trophy Point. The location of the Flag Pole and Battle Monument. The Battle Monument has the names of 2,230 officers who were killed as members of the US Regular Army during the Civil War. Trophy Point is also where one can relax and take in the best view the Hudson Valley has to offer.

Jefferson Hall (Cadet Library). Completed in August 2008, reflects the Academy’s ongoing commitment to academic excellence. The Cadet Library and the Center for Enhanced Performance, both providers of student-centered information services, are now consolidated in one central location, directly along the path from the barracks to Thayer Hall. The Haig Room, where most of the conference is held, is on the sixth floor of Jefferson Hall.

Thayer Hall. Originally designed and constructed as the Riding Hall, utilizing the vocabulary of the Gothic Revival style that they had incorporated into other buildings at West Point during the same period. The structure originally contained one large free-span space in the main portion of the building, with horse stables and a hay loft located in an adjoining structure at the south end of the west elevation. Between 1955 and 1959, the Riding Hall was converted into an academic building and renamed Thayer Hall.

FAQ

Where is the conference located at West Point?

All conference activities at West Point are within walking distance of each other. A bus will transport you from the Thayer Hotel to the conference area every morning and evening. Most conference activities will be held in U.S. Military Academy library, Jefferson Hall, to include panels and keynote speakers in the Haig Room and breakout sessions with your team in various conference rooms throughout the library. A few other activities will be held in other nearby locations.

When should I plan to arrive?

Registration is from 9am-4pm on Thursday, March 30th, 2023, at the Thayer Hotel at West Point.

Who should I contact when I arrive?

A West Point representative will be on-site and in uniform to welcome you when you arrive at the Thayer Hotel.

Where will I park?

For guests arriving by car, parking is available at the Thayer Hotel and at Buffalo Soldier Field, next to the hotel.

Are there stores at West Point to make small purchases?

Yes, the Cadet Store sells West Point merchandise, snacks, and drinks. There is also a gift shop open to the public, and a bookstore in Thayer Hall, our main academic building. These shops also sell snacks and various Academy memorabilia.

What should I pack?

Your day will be filled with scheduled, conference events. Breakfast will be provided, and conference activities will generally begin around 8am. On Friday and Saturday, we also offer physical fitness events at historic locations around West Point. All attendees are encouraged to attend these memorable events. The conference activities will include panel discussions and then time to work in small teams with your mentor guidance. Expect to be in conference until approximately 8pm each evening, with evening social events following the official activities.

What is the weather like?

The weather in New York in late March is usually around 48 Fahrenheit (9 Celsius) during the day with lows at night around 29 Fahrenheit (-2 Celsius) with a possibility of cold rain and snow. Regardless of the forecast, you should bring a jacket in case it is cold, and at least one warm-weather outfit in case it is unseasonably warm.

Will we interact with cadets?

Yes, West Point is nominating cadets to attend the conference. You will be working with cadets as well as with students from other schools throughout the conference, and you are encouraged to network and mingle with both.

How are we moving around at the conference?

Transportation will be provided to/from the hotel at the beginning and end of each day; it is about a 20-minute walk if you choose to make it. The conference buildings are within 5 minutes' walk of each other, and any other locations you may choose to visit—tourist attractions such as Trophy Point or Kosciuszko's Garden, or the Cadet Chapel—are within 10 minutes' walk of the conference buildings.

What food will there be?

All meals will be provided for you; please inform us if you have specific dietary needs and we will try to accommodate you (Kosher, Halal, Vegetarian, etc.). Snacks and drinks will be provided between events, and there will be an opportunity to eat one meal in the Cadet Mess Hall.

How much money should I bring?

All meals will be provided for you. While snacks will be provided between most events, any additional food that you may desire, or souvenirs can also be purchased at various locations.

Are there fees?

There are no fees for those attending the conference. All lodging and food will be provided.

Conference Conduct and Safety

We look forward to exploring the topics of leadership and character with you. Your safety during your time at West Point is of the utmost importance to us. We ask that all visiting student fellows remain on campus for the duration of the conference. If a student fellow needs to travel off campus, please see Major Steve Fennessy for assistance.
